


Leaving the crowd behind, they took him along, just as he was, in the boat. There were also other boats with him. A furious squall came up, and the waves broke over the boat, so that it was nearly swamped. Jesus was in the stern, sleeping on a cushion. The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?"

He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still?" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm. He said to his disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

Psalm 10:1 - Why, LORD, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?

Psalm 44:23 - Awake, Lord! Why do you sleep? Rouse yourself! Do not reject us forever.

Job 30:20 - I cry out to you, God, but you do not answer; I stand up, but you merely look at me.

Jesus on the cross - My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

[The disciples] fear and lack of understanding are interrelated. Their fear prevents them from understanding, and their inability to understand leaves them frightened. Thus the issue is not a lack of intelligence. Mark is showing something more profound. Fear inhibits understanding, and misunderstanding generates fear.

The Parable of the Growing Seed

He also said, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how. All by itself the soil produces grain—first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the head. As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts the sickle to it, because the harvest has come."

The Parable of the Mustard Seed

Again he said, "What shall we say the kingdom of God is like, or what parable shall we use to describe it? It is like a mustard seed, which is the smallest of all seeds on earth. Yet when planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all garden plants, with such big branches that the birds can perch in its shade."

In telling his disciples these parables Jesus is attempting to broaden their imagination of what is possible in the coming of the kingdom. Ways of being, even very small ones, have been opened up that weren't there before. And they don't stay small. They outgrow other ways of being. They grow until even forces of chaos which previously seemed insurmountable become havens for hope.

The disciples are vulnerable to both fear and a lack of understanding because the rule of God is both awesome and contrary to customary patterns of thinking. The disciples are thinking in human terms and have not grasped the mind-set of faith in the rule of God. It becomes clear early in the story that the disciples have difficulty because of their lack of understanding and their fear.

They do not get the riddles Jesus tells. They do not see the full possibilities of the rule of God... In their fear and lack of understanding, the disciples are similar to the authorities. Like the authorities, they think in false expectations and limited categories. And like the authorities, they are afraid.
